

# Report on Oratory Club Activity (Classes 1 to 5)

## Class 2

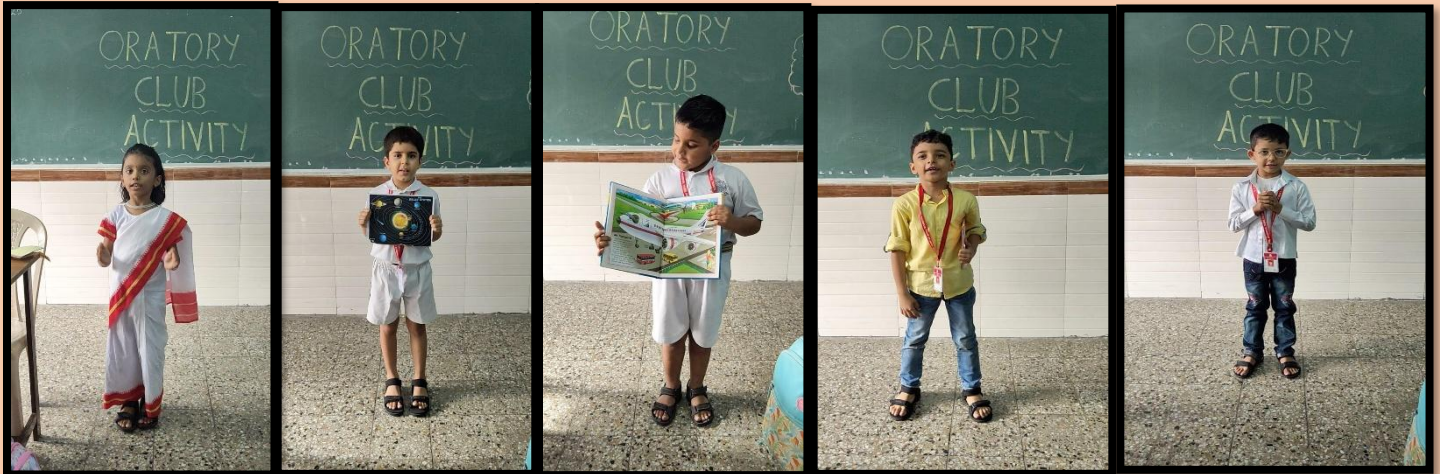
### Activity-1 Picture Talk

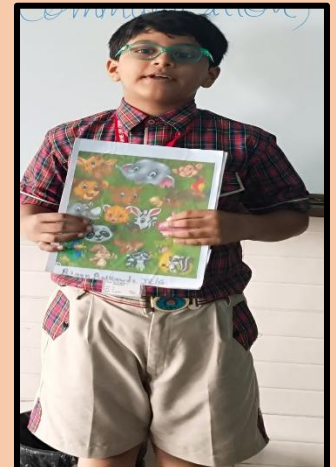




## Class 4

The students of **Class 4** took on the role of little adventurers in the **Jungle Explorer** activity.

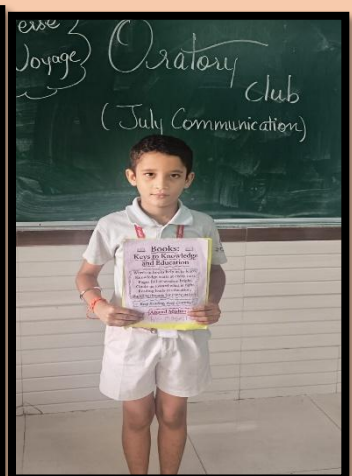
